A compelling and satisfying new mystery in Higashino's most popular Detective Galileo series


The body of a young man is found floating in Tokyo Bay. But his death was no accident – Ryota Uetsuji was shot. He'd been reported missing the week before by his live-in girlfriend Sonoko Shimauchi, but when detectives from the homicide squad go to interview her, she is nowhere to be found. She's taken time off from work; clothes and effects are missing from the apartment she shared. And when the detectives learn that she was the victim of domestic abuse, they presume that she was the killer. But her alibi is airtight – she was hours away in Kyoto when Ryota disappeared, forcing Detectives Kusanagi and Utsumi to restart their investigation. If Sonoko didn't kill her abusive lover, then who did?

A thin thread of association leads them to their old consultant, brilliant physicist Manabu Yukawa, known in the department as 'Detective Galileo'. With Sonoko still missing, the detectives investigate other threads of association – an eccentric artist, who was Sonoko's mother figure after her own single mother passed; and an older woman who is the owner of a hostess club. And how is Sonoko continuing to stay one step ahead of the police searching for her? It's up to Galileo to find the nearly hidden threads of history and coincidence that connect the people around the bloody murder – which, surprisingly, connect to his own traumatic past – to unravel not merely the facts of the crime but the helix that ties them all together.

Keigo Higashino is one of Japan's best-selling novelists, his works translated into more than twenty languages. He's best known for this Detective Galileo mystery series (*The Devotion of Suspect X*) and his Kyoichiro Kaga series (*Malice, The Final Curtain*). Far from EUtopia: How Europe is failing and Britain could do better

Britain may have its problems but those who argue the EU is doing better are seeing a fantasy. In reality, the EU has all of Britain's problems – and more.

In 2020, after three and a half years of bitter negotiations, Britain left the European Union. For some it was a day of freedom, for others a tragedy which would leave Britain isolated and poorer. Vote Brexit, the Remain campaign warned us, and it would be an act of self-harm. The economy would collapse, sending prices and unemployment soaring. Meanwhile, in contrast to xenophobic, inward-looking Britain, the EU would soar ahead without us.


But is that really what has happened? Ross Clark reveals just how badly the EU is doing – and how, in many ways, Britain is doing better. Since Brexit, for example, the UK economy has grown faster than Germany's. In spite of inflation which followed the pandemic and the invasion of Ukraine, Britain has the lowest food prices in Europe. The air is cleaner than in many countries. Surveys repeatedly suggest there is less racism and xenophobia in Britain than in almost any other European country.

For years, European economies have been far more sluggish than those of other developed countries. In the absence of economic growth and with high migration, European societies are strained. The far right is advancing and public disillusionment with the EU growing quickly. While Britain shares many of Europe's problems to a greater or less extent, this hard-hitting polemic argues that it now has the means to disentangle itself from the EU's drawstrings and set off on a more prosperous path.

On the coast of southern China, an eccentric entrepreneur spent three decades steadily building an obscure telecom company into one of the world's most powerful technological empires with hardly anyone noticing. This all changed in December 2018, when the detention of Meng Wanzhou, Huawei Technologies' female scion, sparked an international hostage standoff, poured fuel on the US-China trade war, and suddenly thrust the mysterious company into the international spotlight.

In *House of Huawei*, Washington Post technology reporter Eva Dou pieces together a remarkable portrait of Huawei's reclusive founder Ren Zhengfei, and how he built a sprawling corporate empire – one whose rise Western policymakers have become increasingly obsessed with halting. The book dissects the global web of power, money, influence, surveillance, bloodshed and national glory that Huawei helped to build – and that has also ensnared it.

Based on wide-ranging interviews and painstaking archival research, *House of Huawei* tells an epic story of familial and political intrigue that presents a fresh window on China's rise from third-world country to US rival, and shines a clarifying light on the security considerations that keep world leaders up at night.

House of Huawei holds a mirror up to one of the world's most mysterious companies as never before.

For readers of Elizabeth Strout and Anne Tyler, a life-affirming novel about marriage, friendship and the powerful dignity of a woman forced to rebuild her life – unexpectedly and alone – in 1960s Texas.

She made herself see Robert with the kids, telling stories of crafty, talking rabbits and determined turtles, his face bright with meanings, with silliness. Made herself see the two of them laughing together in bed, they had done that. That was true. Through the years, they'd had happiness and closeness. They had.

As Eliza sits at her husband's funeral, still stunned by the suddenness of his death, she discovers a lie that turns her life upside down. Almost overwhelmed by the dawning understanding that she has known nothing true about her life, Eliza can't see a way forward at first. How should she come to terms with all that has been a lie? How can she live with herself?

A nostalgic celebration of the golden age of aviation, celebrating one hundred years of the Moth.

The first flight of Captain de Havilland's Moth, hardly six years after the Great War, took place at a time when the conquest of the air was at last being turned to peaceful pursuits. And it was the DH60 Moth, more than any other type, which showed that flying was safe, practical and, potentially, open to all.

True, many early Mothists were uber-privileged. The Prince of Wales had one, as did his brother, the Duke of Gloucester. Beryl Markham, who had affairs with both, learned to fly in a Moth. Other early enthusiasts included Philip Sassoon, one of the richest commoners in the land, Lady Bailey who flew her Moth to Cape Town and back, Viscount de Sibour who flew his wife round the world in one and the future traitor, Colonel the Master of Semphill.

But Laura Ingalls, who did 980 successive loops in hers, Aspy Engineer, the Indian schoolboy who won the Aga Khan Trophy in his and Amy Johnson, the typist from Hull who flew hers to Australia showed that you didn't need to be a superhero or super wealthy to be a pilot. Just a little mad, perhaps.

In this story, as entertaining as it is extraordinary, the reader is introduced to a scarcely believable cast of characters whose courage, determination and epic eccentricity is shown in the light of what it is actually like to fly these remarkable aeroplanes.

One night in 1931 William Wallace was handed a phone message at his chess club from a Mr Qualtrough, asking him to meet at an address to discuss some work. Wallace caught a tram from the home he shared with his wife, Julia, to the address which turned out, after Wallace had consulted passers-by and even a policeman, to not exist.


On returning home two hours later he found his wife beaten to death in the parlour. The elaborate nature of his alibi pointed to Wallace as the culprit. He was arrested and tried, found guilty of murder and sentenced to hang, but the next month the Court of Criminal Appeal sensationally overturned the verdict and he walked free. The killer was never found.

Fifteen years on, the inspector who worked the case is considering it once more. Speculation continues to be rife over the true killer's identity. James Agate in his diary called it 'the perfect murder', Raymond Chandler said 'The case is unbeatable. It will always be unbeatable'. And on a cruise in 1947, new information is about to come to light.

The Colour of Injustice

From the winner of the 2020 Costa Biography Award for The Louder I Will Sing, The Colour of Injustice is a passionate call to reflect upon and re-examine Britain's relationship with justice. Lee Lawrence tells the most compelling and outrageous stories of crimes against Black people in Britain and in doing so ask profound questions about contemporary British society.


The Colour of Injustice evolves through a dozen core cases involving race-based criminal injustice, dating from 1919 – Charles Wotten, who, having served in the Royal Navy during WW1, was murdered by a mob in Cardiff – to the present day. By incorporating societal, judicial and police services change to add context, Lee Lawrence shows that, while progress has been made, large gaps remain.

The first post-war murder of a Black person in Britain was that of Kelso Cochrane, a case which shares many disturbing aspects with the murder of Stephen Lawrence more than thirty years later. His death did, however, inspire the creation of the Notting Hill Carnival. No one has ever been charged and the case remains unsolved. Subsequent key stories range from that of David Oluwale in 1971 (the first successful prosecution of British police officers for involvement in the death of a Black person) to the Mangrove Nine, the death of thirteen people in the New Cross Fire, and the shooting of Lee's own mother by Brixton police in 1985.

About the author:

Lee Lawrence is a social entrepreneur who works to help marginalised people find their voice, manage conflict and achieve justice. In 2014, he founded Mobility Enterprises with the hope of aiding those who would otherwise struggle in their daily life by providing public transport for the disabled. In 2016, he founded the Cherry Groce Foundation which exists to enhance the wellbeing of individuals with a physical or mental impairment. Lawrence is the author of *The Louder I Will Sing*, winner of the 2020 Costa Biography Award. He regularly lectures to the Metropolitan Police.

A thought-provoking, moving and wryly funny memoir about the author's experience of having a baby with a rare genetic disorder – and how this feels in the age of the internet.


At 's seven-month scan, the doctor analysing the ultrasound saw something he 'didn't like' – a potentially serious abnormality in her baby. Telling the moving story of this moment and everything that happened afterwards, explores how it feels to become a parent in a culture in which everything is mediated by the internet and technology, in which the click of a mouse can conjure infinite information at any time – along with infinite opinions, suggestions and judgements.

Exploring the outer reaches of different approaches to parenthood – from genetic testing and the pursuit of 'a normal baby' to freebirthers' refusal of any medical care or intervention into pregnancy – she explores compelling questions about how technology is changing culture, our relationships and our most fundamental human experiences. At the heart of the book is her own deeply emotional story – told in brilliantly stylish prose, alive with sharp insight and wry humour.


An rich, engrossing and deeply enjoyable story of a woman who moves from Taiwan to California and builds an unexpected life.

Blood and Treasure

The story of the economics of conflict from the Viking Age to the war in Ukraine.

Wars are expensive, both in human terms and monetary ones. Since at least the 1640s, in the aftermath of the English Civil War, the phrase 'blood and treasure' has sought to encapsulate these costs.


Two economic notions, in particular, feature in this book: incentives and institutions. A rational look at incentives explains even the most seemingly irrational behaviour – and few things are as irrational as war. Crucially, incentives are not formed in a vacuum, they are shaped by the wider social, cultural and political context – the kind of things economists call institutions (i.e. the state). Over time institutions change and with them incentives change too. Together institutions and incentives shape and explain human behaviour. Over the long span of human history, nothing has shaped institutions – and hence economic outcomes – as much as war and violence.

Blood and Treasure examines why Genghis Khan should be regarded as the father of globalisation, how New World gold and silver kept Spain poor, why some economists think of witch trials as a form of 'non-price competition', how pirate captains were pioneers of effective HR techniques, how handing out medals hurt the Luftwaffe in the Second World War and why economic theories helped to create a tragedy in Vietnam. Along the way it considers why some medieval kings were right to arm their soldiers with inferior weapons, takes some management lessons from Joseph Stalin and asks if a culture of patronage and cronyism helped the Royal Navy rise to greatness. It also analyses the changing economic costs of war and ask whether war is always bad for the economy.

Duncan Weldon the author of *Two Hundred Years of Muddling Through: The surprising story of Britain's economy from boom to bust and back again*, was previously the Britain Economics Correspondent at the *Economist*, the Economics Correspondent for *Newsnight*, the BBC's flagship nightly current affairs show, and a columnist for *Prospect* magazine. He has written and presented several documentaries for BBC Radio 4, including *World War Two: The Economic Battle*. Felix Pearl – a young transplant to the city, whose photography and film work that day provokes in this previously unformed soul a sharp sense of personal destiny.


Royal Davis – owner of a failing Harlem funeral home, whose desperate trolling of the scene for potential 'customers' triggers a quest to find another path in life.

Set during an atmospheric Yorkshire winter, raw content is a dark, funny and moving story of a young woman whose experience growing up against the backdrop of the Moors murders and a local case of child abuse that came too close to home have taught her one thing: love and danger are two sides of the same coin.

Grace's work requires her to be careful. She spends her days reading and editing legal case files, making sure the latest judgments are published as quickly and accurately as possible. But outside of her work, Grace is not a careful person. Her father's history as a police officer working across an infamous case of child abuse shadows her life, as does the violent history entrenched across the landscape of her childhood, and her fears often surface as recklessness. When Grace becomes unexpectedly pregnant, she tries to accommodate her boyfriend and the prospect of the baby in her life. But after the relief and strange joy of the birth, Grace starts to imagine all sorts of terrible injuries and deaths befalling her child. The steep stairs to her apartment, the kitchen scissors, a boiling kettle all suddenly hold visceral and overwhelming potential for disaster. The baby's vulnerability terrifies her: fault lines in her relationship begin to show, and her family history and repressed memories of violence break to the surface.

Tender, gripping and life-affirming, *raw content* tells the story of a woman grappling with a new form of love that feels like a disaster.

Prosecuting the Powerful: War crimes and the Battle for Justice

Could Putin or other war criminals ever be put on trial? Steve Crawshaw's compelling new history of prosecuting war crimes shows how it is more likely than you might think.

Could we ever see Vladimir Putin in the dock for his crimes? What about a Western ally like Benjamin Netanyahu? Putting a country's leader on trial once seemed unthinkable. But as journalist and human rights advocate Steve Crawshaw describes in *Prosecuting the Powerful* – a blend of vivid reportage and gripping history – a series of remarkable changes in recent years means that, despite many challenges, both scenarios are now a possibility.

Drawing on his on-the-ground reporting from the front lines of justice in Ukraine and Israel, as well as earlier encounters with Serbian leader Slobodan Milošević and other war criminals, Crawshaw tells the story of the long struggle for accountability. Beginning with the origins of the Geneva Conventions in the nineteenth century, the book travels via Raphael Lemkin, who coined the term 'genocide' and pressed for its punishment, and the Syrian police photographer who helped put a torturer behind bars, up to the fierce arguments today over who exactly the International Criminal Court in The Hague should hold accountable for war crimes. Survivors are determined to achieve change. As Crawshaw argues, Western double standards cannot be allowed to tip the scales of justice.

Steve Crawshaw has written and worked on human rights and justice for more than thirty years. He was a journalist at Granada Television before joining the *Independent* at launch in 1986, where his roles included Russia and East Europe Editor during the east European revolutions and Balkan wars, then Germany bureau chief and chief foreign correspondent. In 2002, he joined Human Rights Watch as UK director and then UN advocacy director in New York. In 2010 he joined Amnesty International as international advocacy director and then Director of the Office of the Secretary General. In 2018 he became policy and advocacy director at Freedom from Torture. It shows how a unique history, of triumph and tragedy – in particular the legacy of Hillsborough and subsequent boycott of the *Sun* – has led to its distinctive status today.

Liverpool’s idiosyncrasies mean we need to explore its history to understand how it has become what it is now – for the story of Liverpool is key to understanding modern Britain: trade, racism, Empire, deindustrialisation, immigration, and popular culture have all left an important imprint. It is of the UK but its modern identity is defined in part in opposition to ‘Britishness’.

This book will discuss the origins of Scouse separateness, the importance of football within the city, the unusual history of the Scouse accent, Liverpool’s politics, culture, and rivalry with Manchester, the Liverpoolian diaspora, and the UK’s love-hate relationship with the city. It will intersperse the story of the city with Swift’s own story: relating what he learned about the city during the first eighteen years of his life; what he subsequently learned about outsiders’ views of Liverpool and its citizens in the eighteen years since he left; and his impressions of how the city has changed whenever he returns.

David Swift is a historian and writer based in London who specialises on the history and contemporary politics of the British left, in particular in relation to race, class, gender and popular culture. He has researched and taught at several universities in the UK and abroad. His first book, *A Left for Itself*, was released by the radical publisher Zero Books in 2019. The Rage of Party will tell the dramatic and strangely neglected story of Britain's first – and most rambunctious – burst of party politics.

Between 1695 and 1715, there were ten general elections, and political partisanship gripped Britain to an extent never known before and seldom, if ever, since. Tory and Whig engaged in a ferocious and all-consuming political battle royale over issues of religion, monarchical succession, foreign policy, finance and much more besides.

This political conflict – usually known as the 'Rage of Party' – was extraordinary in intensity and duration. At the level of high politics, it was a tale of speculation, betrayal, attempted assassination, whoring and outrageously cynical parliamentary scheming.

In addition, the era saw a sparkling and caustic literary battle featuring some of the giants of English literature. Jonathan Swift became the chief champion of the Tories. Moderates could rely on the pen of Daniel Defoe; the Whigs claimed the services of Joseph Addison and Richard Steele, while the Tories counted Alexander Pope and John Gay among their partisans. It was also an era of extraordinary, albeit now largely forgotten, political personalities whose moral deficiencies make those of Boris Johnson look positively trivial.

Although complex, at its heart the Whig–Tory divide was between Tory 'Old England' and the mobile, innovative, cosmopolitan forces of Whig progress. For all that some of the issues at stake might seem antiquarian now, in many ways they map onto the divisions we see today between Brexiteers and Remainers, 'Somewheres and Anywheres', conservative provinces and progressive cities. It was, in some ways, a precursor of our modern 'culture wars' and intense political polarisation.

There is a myth that the long, dark days before punk were full of legions of British prog rock groups; that the likes of Yes, Genesis, King Crimson, Emerson, Lake & Palmer and Jethro Tull roamed the land, soiling the culture like university-educated orcs. Wrong.

The mid-seventies were dense with extraordinarily sophisticated, mature rock music made by singers, songwriters and musicians who had no problem calling themselves artists. None at all. 1975 was the greatest year of them all.


In the nineteenth century, as Britain became the world's most powerful industrial empire, Ireland starved. The Great Famine fractured long-held assumptions about political economy and 'civilisation', threatening disorder in Britain itself. Ireland was a laboratory for empire, shaping British ideas about colonisation, population, ecology and work.

Scanlan reinterprets the history of this time and the result is a revelatory account of the Irish Great Famine (1845–1851). In the first half of the nineteenth century, nowhere in Europe – or the world – did the working poor depend as completely on potatoes as in Ireland. To many British observers, potatoes were evidence of a lack of modernity and 'civilization' among the Irish. Ireland before the Famine, however, more closely resembled capitalism's future than its past. Irish labourers were paid some of the lowest wages in the British empire, and relied on the abundance of the potato to survive. Scanlan expertly shows how the staggering inequality, pervasive debt, outrageous rent-gouging, precarious employment, and vulnerability to changes in commodity prices that torment so many in the twenty-first century were rehearsed in the Irish countryside before the potatoes failed.

Padraic X. Scanlan earned a BA (Hons) in History from McGill University in 2008, and a PhD in History from Princeton University in 2013.
