"Only if you don't start running around,"




Rob had an idea. "We could all go to the park.

"I know," said Jamal. "But I've told everyone I'm having a football party in the park.




"What do you think I should do?" Jamal asked.

"You can wear it this afternoon," said Rob.


At last, Jamal had made up his mind, and now

Jamal jumped into the air and cheered.




"Thanks," grinned Amira, "That was a really good pass."

Independent Reading

This series is designed to provide an opportunity for your child to read on their own. These notes are written for you to help your child choose a book and to read it independently.

In school, your child's teacher will often be using reading books which have been banded to support the process of learning to read. Use the book band colour your child is reading in school to help you make a good choice. *The Big Match* is a good choice for children reading at White Band in their classroom to read independently.

The aim of independent reading is to read this book with ease, so that your child enjoys the story and relates it to their own experiences.

About the book

Jamal is looking forward to his birthday, but he's got a difficult choice to make. Does he have a football party in the park with his friends, or join his dad to see his favoutite team play?

Before reading

Help your child to learn how to make good choices by asking: "Why did you choose this book? Why do you think you will enjoy it?" Look at the cover together and ask: "What sort of event is happening on the front cover? Do you think the boy in the story is going to have to make a choice of some kind? Why? Remind your child that they can break longer words into syllables or sound out letters to make a word if they get stuck.

Decide together whether your child will read the story independently or read it aloud to you.



During reading

Remind your child of what they know and what they can do independently. If reading aloud, support your child if they hesitate or ask for help by telling the word. If reading to themselves, remind your child that they can come and ask for your help if stuck.

After reading

Support comprehension by asking your child to tell you about the story. Use the story order puzzle to encourage your child to retell the story in the right sequence, in their own words. The correct sequence can be found on the next page.

Help your child think about the messages in the book that go beyond the story and ask:: "Why did Jamal have difficulty making a choice about his birthday plans? What did he think about to make a choice?"

Give your child a chance to respond to the story: "Why do you think Jamal chose to have a party? What would you choose to do? Why?"

Extending learning

Help your child predict other possible outcomes of the story by asking: "If Jamal had chosen to go to the match with his dad, what might have happened? Do you think he made the right decision? Why/why not? Could he have thought of a different solution?" In the classroom, your child's teacher may be teaching different kinds of sentences. There are many examples in this book that you could look at with your child, including statements, commands, exclamations and questions. Find these together and point out how the end punctuation can help us understand the meaning of the book.
