The Modern Bestiary is a compendium of curious creatures. From the familiar to the improbable, the gross to the endearing, it includes both animals that have made headlines (pangolins, bats, giant hornets), and those you've probably never heard of, such as skin-eating caecilians, sea bunnies, or zombie worms - also known as bone-eating snot flowers.

Along with stories of well-known species told from unexpected angles (rats who drive cars, elephants who selfmedicate, or chickens with their remarkable 300-degree vision), it also includes stranger and lesser-known creatures, such as bum-breathing river turtles; gelada monkeys who 'tame' Ethiopian wolves in a dog-like way; or antechinuses, small marsupials who literally mate themselves to death. Then there are the 'aliens on Earth' - the incredible, the surreal, the magical. Unlike medieval bestiaries, this book has no need to include mythical creatures - animals such as tardigrades, sea slugs and anglerfish are so extraordinary they make unicorns look commonplace.

Her academic interests include conservation biology, behavioural ecology and the intersection of technology and zoology.
