
The activities included here are suitable for the classroom or library sessions.


Asterix was first published in France in 1959. Since then, 39 comic books have been released. Here are the front covers of 6 of the books in the Asterix series:















Which front cover do you like best and why?

- **6.** An alien spaceship appears above Asterix's village




Discussion questions

- 1. Where do you think this story might be set?
- 2. What do you think a 'griffin' might be?
- **3.** What do you think might happen in this story?
- **4.** Can you think of 5 questions you have about the book based on the front cover?
- **5.** Have a read of the blurb on the back of the book. Can you find 5 strong adjectives?

ASTERIX AND THE GRIFFIN EXTRACT 1

Discussion questions

- 1. People read comics in different ways. Some read the words first then go back and look at the pictures; others look at the pictures first then go back and read the words. Some read the words and pictures together. (There's no right or wrong!) How did you read the page on the right? Compare with a partner.
- 2. In what year is the book set?
- 3. Have a look at the first panel. What do notice? Why do you think the illustrator has chosen to make this panel the length of the page?
- **4.** How did the Romans feel about the unknown world that lies beyond their lands? Can you find evidence on the page to support your answer?
- 5. Why do you think some words are written on a yellow background and some written on a white background?
- 6. What does the word 'enigmatic' mean? What is it used to describe here?

- **7.** What is the name of the Greek explorer mentioned? How is this a play on words?
- **8.** Where does Cartographus think the Griffin can be found?





ACTIVITY 1: JULIUS CAESAR

Asterix and his friends are fictional characters, but Julius Caesar was a REAL person (and a very powerful one). Julius Caesar was born in Rome in 100 BC. He rose through the ranks of the Roman army to become a general. In 58 BC, he led an army of Romans into the region that was called Gaul. This region was made up of modern-day France, Belgium and Luxembourg, plus most of Switzerland and some of western Germany and northern Italy. Caesar and his army fought the people who lived in Gaul in a series of wars called the Gallic Wars. By 50 BC, Caesar had defeated the Gauls and taken control of the region.

Can you colour in the region of Gaul on the map below? You might need to use an atlas or online map to help you. Can you also label Rome?



Fun fact: It's thought that the famous quote "veni, vidi, vici" (I came, I saw, I conquered) was said by Julius Caesar.

ACTIVITY 2: A ROMAN COIN

Roman coins often had the face of somebody powerful and important on one side and a picture or symbol to represent this person's achievements on the other side. Julius Caesar was the first living person to have his portrait on a Roman coin. What do you think this coin might have looked like? Can you draw it below? You might like to use the illustrations of Caesar in *Asterix and the Griffin* to give you ideas.





- 5. What threat are the shaman and the other Sarmatians facing?
- 6. Can you name the three characters leading the Romans into Sarmatian territory?
- **7.** What is a Venator?
- 8. Can you find one panel in which the illustrator has drawn the picture from a distanced perspective (like a 'long shot' in a film)? Can you find one panel in which the illustrator has drawn a close up? Why do you think the illustrator has used these different perspectives?





ACTIVITY 2: MYTHOLOGICAL CREATURES

The Romans are searching for a mythical creature called the Griffin. The Griffin has the head and wings of an eagle and the body of a lion. You are going to create your own mythical creature! Your mythical creature will be made up of different animals, just like the Griffin.

French vocabulary:





To begin, spin the spinner below to select an animal. Your creature will have the head of this animal! Draw the head top box on the next page. Now spin the spinner again to select a different animal. Your creature will have the body of this animal! Draw the body in the next box down. Continue until you have a complete mythical creature!



Tip: To use this spinner, put the tip of a pencil through a paper clip and place it on the centre of the circle. Now, flick the paper clip and see which animal it lands on!



- **3.** Why do you think the illustrator chose to write some words in large, bold font?
- **4.** Can you find an example of onomatopoeia?
- **5.** How do you think the Centurion feels when he realises it is not the Griffin? How can you tell?
- **6.** Comic book illustrators sometimes use motion lines to show how a character or object is moving. Can you find any motion lines in this extract?
- **7.** Why do you think the writer has included speech bubbles containing only exclamation marks and questions marks?
- **8.** Can you find a picture which makes you feel you are looking down from above? Can you find a picture which makes you feel you are on the ground looking up? Why do you think the illustrator has chosen to use these different perspectives?

- Punctuation marks in speech bubbles


