

These led to run-ins with the police, trouble at school and eventually the risk of estrangement from his family by defying their wish for his arranged marriage in favour of choosing the woman he loved. With each new trial, Sajid learned to dig his heels in further, speaking up for himself and stubbornly refusing to accept the limits that seemed imposed by his background. Told with honesty, heart and humour, *The Colour of Home* charts Sajid's remarkable rise from adversity to the heart of British life. It is a story of hope, determination and survival – a tribute to the parents who gave everything and the brothers who struggled alongside him – and an invitation to every 'outsider' to keep going and dream big.

Sajid Javid was a Conservative Member of the British Parliament from May 2010 to July 2024. He served in the Cabinet of three Prime Ministers as the Secretary of State for six different departments, including the Home Office and Treasury, most recently serving as the Secretary of State for Health during the COVID-19 pandemic. Sajid is currently chair of the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust.



We are living longer and our lifespan after the middle years continues to extend due to medical advances. But how do you age wisely? Dr Frank Tallis is a writer and clinical psychologist. His non-fiction books include *Lovesick*, *The Incurable Romantic* and *The Act of Living*. He is also the author of the *Liebermann Papers*, a psychoanalytic detective series set in Freud's Vienna and adapted for television as the BBC drama *Vienna Blood*. He lives in London.



Flight-Lieutenant Colin Bell's *Bloody Dangerous* is a powerful and inspiring portrait of bravery in action. He paints an extraordinarily vivid picture of what it was like to fly a Mosquito - the wooden wonder - in 50 raids over Germany, 13 of them to Berlin itself. As a member of the elite Pathfinder 608 squadron, he was part of the force that arguably did more than any other bombing unit to bring about the Nazis' final surrender.

Bell takes us from pre-war London, where he wooed his girlfriend with tickets to see a new film opening in Leicester Square (it was Gone with the Wind), to terrifying scenes of the Blitz itself - he joined up after seeing a bomb fall on the other side of the street on which he was walking.

Today he is an active supporter of several Veteran groups, including the RAF Benevolent Fund and is well known for his talks on his wartime service. He continues to drive, to travel and to be active on social media.

Mother Tongue: A Memoir

In this emotionally rich memoir, the New York Times bestselling author of True Biz, and Women's Prize longlisted author of *Girl at War*, retraces her path out of the hearing world and into the deaf community - and seeks to understand the journeys her own children must take.

Sara Nović's early years were filled with music, Bible study, and a strong desire to fit in. But when she failed her school's mandated hearing test, her worldview was thrown into chaos. Desperate not to be marked as different, she told no one, staying in the hearing world for as long as she could by brute force. Eventually unable to ignore the fact that she was deaf, Nović sought out other deaf people and was welcomed into a tight knit community rooted in the beauty and joy of American Sign Language. Nović realized that rather than maintaining the facade of her old life or trying to straddle two worlds, she would need to cultivate a life in the space between.

Now the mother of two young sons - one, biological and hearing, the other, adopted and deaf-Nović reflects on her life both before and after parenthood. She's raising her children within the deaf world, offering them things her younger self needed, all the while knowing that as her children grow, their own paths will branch off from hers in ways she cannot fully predict or plan for.

Interwoven with Novic's personal story is a remarkable portrait of America through reflections on some of its most complex histories: the rise of the Christian right, the thorny world of international adoption, and above all, the deaf and disabled communities' stubborn survival in the face of persistent oppression.

Sara Novic teaches in the Popular Fiction MFA program at Emerson College, and is an instructor of Deaf studies at Stockton University. Her first novel, *Girl at War*, won the American Library Association's Alex Award, was longlisted for the Women's Prize for Fiction, and was a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize. Novic has an MFA in fiction and literary translation from Columbia University, and lives with her family in Philadelphia.


Infinite Jest

Guilt

Keigo Higashino Translated by Giles Murray

The first stand-alone crime novel published in English in almost a decade by Keigo Higashino, the bestselling Japanese novelist

Homicide Detective Godai of the Tokyo Metropolitan Police Department is assigned to investigate the death of a lawyer, Kensuke Shiraishi, whose body was found on a Central Tokyo riverbank. His investigations leads him to one Tatsuro Kuraki, who claims to have had limited contact with Shiraishi - but, surprising the investigators, Kuraki not only confesses to the lawyer's murder, but another one from thirty years ago - for which another man was arrested and died in custody before trial. This brings unexpected resolution to two cases but there is one problem: to Detective Godai the confession rings false.

And Godai is not the only one who cannot accept Kuraki's explanation of both murders and his professed motives. The confessed murderer's son and the victim's daughter both feel strongly that both the act and the motive claimed are untrue.

As Godai investigates further, he discovers that the relation between the murder of thirty years ago and the recent one is complex, raising multi-faceted questions of guilt and innocence. Guilt is a rich novel about crime and its aftereffects on those left behind by both the victim and perpetrator, a twisting, compelling work that will surprise and astonish.

Born in Osaka and currently living in Tokyo, **Keigo Higashino** is the bestselling, best-known novelist in Japan and around Asia, with numerous television and film adaptations of his work appearing in several languages. He's the author of *The Devotion of Suspect X*, which was the finalist for the Edgar Award for best novel, and Malice, among many others.

Working as a campus security guard at a university, George earns just above the minimum wage to provide for his family and protect the next generation of professionals. A few years ago, he was a 'key worker'; a member of Britain's essential service economy who were chosen to keep going out when we stayed in, risking their health to serve the people and keep the world on its axis. In return for their efforts, they received the nation's applause from doorsteps every Thursday night.

Fast-forward to now, and the term 'key worker' has become a thing of the past. Instead, that network of low-paid workers who kept society on its feet find themselves tagged with another term; 'the working poor'. With wages and working conditions unmoved by the outpouring of gratitude from just three years ago, and rises in inflation sounding like a death-knell to thousands of families country-wide, What The Bouncer Saw provides an honest account of life on the frontlines of the working poor.



Far from the spotlights of the Hollywood film sets and the flashbulbs of the press, Marilyn Monroe was a great reader and lover of books.

Through her deep research, Crowther delves into Marilyn's personal collection of books, and recounts some of these meetings, like the time Monroe shared an apartment with Shelley Winters in West Hollywood, where they invited and entertained Dylan Thomas and Christopher Isherwood for drinks (probably several drinks) after which Monroe arranged for Thomas to meet his childhood hero, Charlie Chaplin. Or when Life magazine arranged for Monroe to be interviewed by Dame Edith Sitwell at the Sunset Tower Hotel in the hope that Monroe would embarrass herself and Sitwell tear her to shreds. Their hopes were shattered when Sitwell was both charmed and blown away by Monroe's intelligence and they subsequently became friends later meeting in London and New York.

Marilyn And Her Books: The Literary Life of Marilyn Monroe will chart how Monroe, who left high school before graduation, embarked on an impressive and progressive program of self-education hungry for knowledge, and devouring books as an active and engaged reader.

Gail Crowther is a writer, researcher, and academic. She is the author of Dorothy Parker in Hollywood, Three-Martini Afternoons at the Ritz: The Rebellion of Sylvia Plath & Anne Sexton, The Haunted Reader & Sylvia Plath, and the coauthor of Sylvia Plath in Devon: A Year's Turning and These Ghostly Archives: The Unearthing of Sylvia Plath. 

Hesket: A Norfolk Haunting

Merging psychological realism and rural terror, *Hesket: A Norfolk Haunting* is a compelling, uncanny page-turner from debut novelist Sara Bayat

Unsettling things are happening in rural Norfolk.

At first glance, Hesket is a blink-and-you-miss-it village, a seemingly unremarkable place that belies its horrifying history. There are tales of witch trials and death, of a curse that lies dormant in the landscape where the women condemned as witches are buried, and a great flood that long ago washed Old Hesket away.

In present-day Hesket, a new development is planned for this woodland. Following various different voices in which the ordinary and the peculiar converge, *Hesket: A Norfolk Haunting* chronicles a quiet community of hard-working people, each contending with their own losses amidst daily life. To their horror, the sacred grounds of their beloved old woods are earmarked for development. As the work commences, despite village protests, strange and unexplained events begin to occur and the lives of the villagers start to disintegrate.

While each of the eight characters has their own story to tell, beautifully and heartrendingly encapsulated within individual chapters, the narrative connects them in a broader tale of jealousy, love, bereavement and joy from beginning to end.

Hesket: A Norfolk Haunting is Sara Bayat's debut work of fiction which formed the creative dissertation of her recently awarded PhD at the University of East Anglia; she was also awarded an MA with distinction from UEA in 2018. She has had some short stories published in *Prism International* and *The Malahat Review*, and was shortlisted for the Bridport Prize, amongst others. 

It's the summer of 2018. Max Anderson, in his early forties, has been living in Berlin for the past decade failing to become the filmmaker he was once tipped to be. But his wife's career is taking off, and with a generous relocation package on offer they've moved with their kids back to London. Not to the Hackney flat share that he left ten years ago but, somewhat bemusedly, into a rented home on Pemberton Place, a handsome tree-lined street near Hampstead Heath. Pemberton Place is populated by couples who have lived there since the seventies, who bought their houses for a song, raised their families, and now sit on a relative fortune. The Boomers, as Max thinks of them, are cultured and urbane, full of shared stories and storied pasts, and immediately take Max under their wing. Flattered and amused by them, Max joins most evenings as they gather to drink wine and reminisce on glories past. Max is both insider and outsider, participant and observer: a position in which he feels disconcertingly comfortable.

Then eight politically mischievous Millennials move in to an empty house on the street and upend Pemberton Place's cosy equilibrium. With the Boomers in their crosshairs they make the street a cause celebre, the front line in the generational battle of the haves and have nots. As the Millennials steadily up the ante and the Boomers try to assert their authority, Max – the street's sole Gen Xer – realises that everyone, eventually, has to pick a side. With wit and a propulsive pace, David Annand spins the battleground of the housing crisis into a brilliantly crafted study in intergenerational difference. The Dice Was Loaded from the Start asks: what does the good life look like? And how might we make meaning in an exhausted world?

David Annand has worked as an editor at *Condé Nast Traveller* and *GQ*. He has written for the *FT*, *TLS*, *Telegraph*, *Literary Review*, the *New Statesman* and *Time Out*. His first novel, *Peterdown*, won the McKitterick Prize in 2022. He currently lives in Spain.


Ada lives a solitary life. She spends her days swimming in her apartment building's pool, occasionally visiting her cousin Francesca, meeting people for drinks, navigating the social mores of a cold and isolating London. Ada's parents are recently divorced: her father spends his days at the gym, warm with human proximity. Her mother spends her days alone.

When she meets a man named Atticus by the pool, Ada immediately senses an intimate connection between them: as if they share a life, in a way she can't explain, maybe even a consciousness. Little by little, Ada's estrangement from her familiar surroundings, memories and reality widens, as though she is seeing her reflection through a mirror, pieces of it falling away. She worries she may be losing her mind. After her mother entreats Ada to join her on a remote Greek holiday, Ada's connection to her world and her body itself falls away completely. She is jolted into a new, artificial environment – the Facility: a place apparently designed to meet her every wish, but where secrets hide along endless hallways and behind closed doors.

When a person's life, in the odd space between mind and body, is inherently one of isolation, are our connections with those around us merely projections of ourselves? And if not, where do they come from?

With precision, subtlety, and confidence Albertine Clarke transforms touches of the sci-fi into an entirely singular experience of deep interiority. *The Body Builders* lands like a blow, widening a crack that allows us to perceive the world differently than we ever imagined.

Whether you have a terminal illness, are in chronic pain, or are disabled, being able to ask your doctor to kill you fundamentally changes society's attitude towards the vulnerable – and in a sinister direction.

For some individuals, an assisted death might be the right choice. But we should be deeply wary of introducing a system that offers death as just another option. Expertly marshalling the arguments, Stock's laser polemic cuts through the wishful thinking and clouded reasoning that surrounds the issue and reaffirms life, rather than death, as what we should be fighting for.

She rebelled against her background at an early age and led a hectic and bohemian life, which included marriages to the painter Lucian Freud, the pianist and composer Israel Citkowitz, and the poet Robert Lowell, who described her as 'a mermaid who dines upon the bones of her winded lovers'. In the 1970s Blackwood began to write. Her novel *Great Granny Webster* was shortlisted for the 1977 Booker Prize.

Mary Renault (1905–1983) was born in London and educated at St Hughs, Oxford. She trained as a nurse at Oxford's Radcliffe Infirmary, where she met her lifelong partner, Julie Mullard. Her first novel, Purposes of Love, was published in 1937. In 1948, after The North Face won an MGM prize worth \$150,000, she and Mullard emigrated to South Africa. 





Daphne du Maurier (1907–1989) was born in London, England. In 1931 her first novel, *The Loving Spirit*, was published. A biography of her father and three other novels followed, but it was the novel *Rebecca* that launched her into the literary stratosphere and made her one of the most popular authors of her day. In 1932, du Maurier married Major Frederick Browning with whom she had three children.

Many of du Maurier's bestselling novels and short stories were adapted into award-winning films, including Alfred Hitchcock's *The Birds* and Nicolas Roeg's *Don't Look Now.* In 1969, du Maurier was awarded the Dame Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (DBE). She lived most of her life in Cornwall, which is the setting for many of her books, and died there.




Shooting Up

Jonathan Tepper

This is Tepper's extraordinary story about growing up in a family of American missionaries in San Blas, a neighbourhood of Madrid, Spain, which had the highest rate of heroin use and juvenile crime in all of Europe in the 1980s. Driven to religious fervour on a mission to find lost sheep, Jonathan's parents take him out to the streets to invite addicts back to the family home. The addicts even play with him in his room, to the horror of fellow missionaries and American relatives. Before long Tepper's world is full of pimps, conmen, bank robbers, dealers, even murderers – and his home becomes a rehabilitation centre. Some addicts in San Blas died of overdoses and others drank themselves to death, but it was not the heroin, the alcohol or even the violence that took so many lives. AIDS hit Spain a few years after it exploded in San Francisco and New York, and it was just as deadly. For San Blas the virus was devastating; many of its youth became part of the 'almost lost generation'. When the epidemic engulfed the neighbourhood, Tepper was a teenager and he stood by helplessly. The men and women in the centre who were recovering from heroin became his brothers and sisters. He loved them in life and learned to mourn them in death. Yet it is the unexpected death of Jonathan's youngest brother Timothy in a car accident that leads him to truly understand grief and the preciousness of life . . .

Jonathan Tepper is the Chief Investment Officer at Prevatt Capital and lives in Nassau, the Bahamas. Jonathan is the founder of Variant Perception, which provided research to asset managers. Formerly, he was an analyst at SAC Capital and a vice president on the proprietary trading desk at Bank of America. Along the way, with his friend and partner Turi Munthe, they founded Demotix, a citizen-journalism website and photo agency. They sold Demotix in 2012 to Corbis, a company owned then by Bill Gates. Jonathan is a Rhodes Scholar and graduated with highest honours in history and honours in economics from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and has an MLitt from the University of Oxford. The blues, punk, hip-hop, alt-rock, country-rock, R&B, jazz, rock 'n' roll and soul. All are canonised. Trad country and disco have long since been re-appraised. Even hair metal has its champions. Yet there has hardly been a positive critical word published about AOR. But this speaks far more to the prejudices and blind spots of music critics than it does about the actual music. The plain fact is, AOR artists were responsible for some of the hugest selling and most timeless records of the era.

Five bands stand tall as AOR's leading lights: Journey, Boston, Foreigner, Toto and REO Speedwagon. Between them, they have to date sold over 335 million records worldwide. Aside from these five bands, there is then a second tier of multi-platinum AOR acts and including the likes of Styx, Survivor, Pat Benatar, Heart, Kansas, Bryan Adams, Loverboy, Night Ranger, Billy Squier and more.

During the period covering 1976–1986, AOR was the music of the American heartland. AOR stood out by its luxurious production, its sumptuous harmonies, and its lovelorn ballads.

Like disco, but not punk, AOR was inclusive, uplifting, and appealed equally to both sexes. Its sheer romanticism, its cinematic sense of possibility, resonated as much with a huge audience of women as it did with men. It was positive, never nihilistic. Music to be sung along with, not to break stuff to. Its songs were made to soundtrack the best of times, or at least to soothe the bad.

It's time for a definitive music history of AOR, told through some of the genre's finest contributors.

Women's freedom is a myth. Or so we're told. If there is one thing that right and left can agree on, it's that this is a very bad time to be female. Misogyny is everywhere and, as the right would have it, thanks to a big fat liberal lie known as the sexual revolution, it is worse than ever. The death of courtship, duty and marriage are nails in the coffin of female happiness.

The left has its own muddled ideas about sex, duty and marriage, but it knows this: girls' and women's bodies are an inventory of pain and suffering that needs to be outed, from period pain to menopause to endometriosis. Indeed, the narrative of female bodily disadvantage is so extreme that experts are beginning to admit it is at least partially responsible for the 5,000 per cent rise in girls reporting to gender clinics claiming to be boys.

Increasingly, in the schemes of both right and left, women's agency is vanishing. In both, they are fragile, eminently breakable, and constantly facing a risk of permanent damage. Fear is everywhere and yet we're at a moment and a place in which women have never ever had it so good.

This book is a call for women – and society – to get back in touch with the joy, freedom and power that Zoe and her female peers, evidently born in a lucky window (post-feminism, pre-internet), saw opening up before them and, to some degree, have realised.

Dr Zoe Strimpel is a journalist, author, broadcaster, debater and academic historian. 



Never, in all of cricket's rich and profound history, has one delivery had such a devastating impact. Rarely, if ever, has a player shot so instantaneously from obscurity to worldwide fame. 



Lords of the Ring is a behind-the-scenes look at the weird and wonderful world of professional wrestling.

For years, wrestling has operated as an unregulated soap opera with controversial storylines and presentations. In a world where fact and fiction is regularly blurred, where Black heritage characters were often presented as savages or ex-prisoners, and women wrestlers mainly took part in 'lingerie' matches, this book explores characters and stereotypes in the wrestling industry, and attempts to get to the heart of what wrestling tells us about our society and why it matters.

Lords of the Ring holds a mirror up to society and looks at how gender, race, national identity and sexuality has been presented through the lens of professional wrestling. It considers wrestling's relationship with politics, including how Donald Trump cultivated a character on the wrestling scene, utilising the live crowds in arenas as a dress rehearsal for his presidential run. It follows interesting figures inside and outside the ropes, the journalists who report on it and the people in the writer's room – with their stories interweaving and culminating in #SpeakingOut (wrestling's #MeToo movement) and allegations against modern wrestling's founding father, Vince McMahon. Written as a first-person narrative, in a similar style to the bestselling books of Craig Brown, Jon Ronson, and Louis Theroux, Lords of the Ring takes the reader on my journey through interviews and experiences.

In 2017, **Dan Bambridge Higgins** created and presented a popular twelve-part podcast about professional wrestling, *The World According to Wrestling* which charted at No. 1 in the iTunes Film and TV Chart, exploring some of the themes touched on in the book (including supporting op-eds in the *New Statesman, Independent*, and *Huff Post*). Dan interviewed popular wrestlers who had portrayed stereotypical or controversial characters, WWE wrestlers Paul 'HHH' Levesque, Rikishi, Olympic Gold Medallist Kurt Angle, Donald Trump's WWE writer Court Bauer, prominent wrestling journalist Dave Meltzer, Andy Kaufman's best friend and associate Bob Zmuda and wrestlers from Britain's 'golden age' including Klondyke Kate.

Keep Your Hair On

Trichotillomania (hair pulling disorder) is common and causes significant distress to those who suffer and their loved ones, but is highly stigmatised and poorly understood. Trichotillomania falls between many cracks; it is not seen as 'serious' enough to be on the medical radar, it isn't considered as a 'legitimate' hair-loss condition by dermatologists/trichologists, and most people – including those who suffer – are not aware of it as a disorder at all. The worst thing to live with is the blame – i.e. my inability to stop my hands from pulling out my hair is my fault. This book will try to move the dial in terms of our understanding of trichotillomania so that it can follow in the wake of other disorders that were historically misattributed as being some sort of character flaw of the person who suffers (e.g. epilepsy, dyslexia, ADHD etc).

Clare Mackay is a Professor of Neuroscience at the University of Oxford. Clare studied for a degree in Psychology, followed by a PhD at the University of Liverpool, after which she moved to the University of Oxford's Department of Psychiatry. She has spent 30 years studying various diseases and disorders of the brain and is now turning her attention to the 'secret shame' that has been with her all along - trichotillomania. Clare went public with her disorder less than 12 months ago since when she has been more convinced than ever that there is a huge unmet need, which is largely hidden by the shame and stigma that surround this disorder. She is now building new collaborations and initiating new research into the causes and treatments for compulsive hair pulling.


Could Try Harder
